

# OUR NEW POLICE.

## THE NEW REGIME INAUGURATED.

### Police Commissioners at Work.

As rapidly as possible and consistent with their policy, the new Police Commissioners Messrs. Tuttle, Wayman and Coventry are bringing into working order the new Police regime. They have been in session daily throughout the present week at the Court House, in the Supervisors' Room, settling upon details and making their appointments of men.

The location of this new arm of our municipal government, is to be in the basement rooms in the south-west corner of the Court House, long known and used as the City Marshal's office, which quarters are being got in readiness for such occupancy. In the meantime the Board are accommodated as above.

By the express terms of Section 7th of the new Police Law, the Police force of the city is to consist of the following officers whose salaries, as annexed, are prescribed in Section 21:

General Superintendent.....	\$1,500
Deputy Superintendent.....	1,200
Three Captains (each).....	700
Six Sergeants (each).....	650
Sixty Patrolmen (each).....	600

It is provided in the Law that the number of Patrolmen may be increased by vote of the Common Council. All removals are to be for cause, and after a hearing before the Board, and all vacancies in Captains or Sergeants' posts are to be filled by promotion.

The Board have appointed Ex-City Marshal Jacob Rehm Deputy Superintendent. It is rumored that C. P. Bradley, at present closely associated with the Board in their deliberations is to be appointed to the Superintendent's post, though for reasons the Board deem sufficient the appointment has not yet been announced. Mr. Rehm has, however, been sworn in and entered actively upon the duties of a sphere not new to him, and which he filled with credit to himself and the city.

Up to last evening, the following had been sworn: Richard J. Paulsen, Captain, assigned to the North Division. It is said that Charles Barker will be sworn in to-day, for the South Division. The following have been duly qualified as

John Nelson and several others had been accepted, who had not been sworn in last evening. The Board do not intend to fill out their entire list now, and probably will not until midsummer bring the number up to the limit fixed by the law. In the above list our city readers will not be slow to recognise the names of numbers of excellent officers, long and well tried in police duties. The rule the Board have adopted in making these selections from the great cloud of applicants, some sixteen hundred in number, is rather severe on short men. All applicants under five feet six need to be extra well provided with qualifications. As some one said, laughingly, "Tobe," is the baby of the number at present qualified. We wish the under-sized men all success in pushing their claims elsewhere.

It is the purpose of the Board to equip the Police in a new and tasteful uniform, similar to that of the Metropolitan Police of New York city, and this will be done forthwith. Altogether, the Board of Police Commissioners are in a fair way and doing well.
