

MARSH MAKES A MOVE

CREGIER'S NEW CHIEF OF POLICE RE-ORGANIZES THE DEPARTMENT.

Four Inspectors Added to the Present Force, Hubbard, Hathaway, Hunt, and O'Donnell Being the Appointees, Ebersold Holding His Rank—Shea, Kipley, and Ward Given Captaincies—Duffy and Bowler Reinstated—Capt. Horace Elliott Transferred to Englewood.

The first step toward the reorganization of the Police Department was taken yesterday, when Superintendent Marsh issued a general order which creates Inspectors, districts for them to inspect, shuffles the Captains and Lieutenants, makes a number of promotions, accepts several resignations, rennumbers the precincts, and otherwise so changes the usual order of things that the average police patrolman will need a week to discover the name of the station where he is detailed and satisfy himself of the names of his immediate superiors.

Superintendent Marsh satisfies all inquiries concerning the duties of his new Inspectors by fixing their rank next below the Superintendent, and making it their duty to see that the property, stations, stock, and apparatus of the department are kept in proper condition and repair, investigate complaints against their men, and promptly prefer charges for all violations of the rules of the department. They are to be held accountable for the proper and faithful performance of police duty, the protection of life and property, the preservation of the peace, and the enforcement of the laws and ordinances within their respective jurisdictions. They are to obey and execute all orders issued by the General Superintendent of Police and be governed by such rules and regulations as he may from time to time establish for the direction and government of the police force.

TO MAKE DAILY REPORTS.

The Inspectors and also the officers in command of the detective department are to make daily reports to the General Superintendent embracing all matters and occurrences in their respective commands—the number of special or extra details made, the number of arrests, and especially a detailed statement of the amount of crime committed or reported during the previous twenty-four hours.

The promotions made are to date from Jan. 1, 1890, and all transfers and assignments take effect this morning at 7 o'clock. The assignment of Inspectors is as follows:

INSPECTORS' DISTRICTS.

- The new Inspectors' districts are:
 - First District—That part of the South Division north of Thirty-ninth street and east of Western avenue.
 - Second District—All that portion of the City of Chicago lying south of Thirty-ninth street, from Lake Michigan to Western avenue, and south of the West Fork of the South Branch of the Chicago River, from Western avenue to the western city limits.
 - Third District—Commencing at the intersection of West Harrison street and the South Branch of the Chicago River, thence along the South Branch and the West Fork of the same to the Belt Line railway tracks, north to West Twelfth street, west to Hyman avenue, or West Forty-eighth street, north to West Madison street, west to Robinson avenue, north to West North avenue, east to Grand avenue, southeast to Homan avenue, south to West Harrison street, and east to the Chicago River.
 - Fourth District—All that portion of the West Division of the City of Chicago lying north of the Third Division as defined in the last preceding section shall constitute the Fourth Division.
 - Fifth District—All of the North Division of the City of Chicago shall constitute the Fifth Division.
